<u>Seafood from the Sound Dinner Celebrates</u> <u>Long Island Sound and the Future of Conservation</u>

STAMFORD, CT/October XX, 2025 – On October 4, SoundWaters, in collaboration with Eating with the Ecosystem and the Foodshed Forum Fairfield County, hosted 56 guests for an unforgettable evening of conversation, food and conservation. The event celebrated the diverse and sustainable seafood species of Long Island Sound, offering a fresh perspective on the region's marine life.

The evening opened with a lively cocktail reception, where guests enjoyed a raw bar and passed appetizers while learning about the work of the Collective Oyster Recycling & Restoration (COOR). Attendees, including Congressman Jim Himes, were immersed in a lively discussion about the ongoing efforts to restore the Sound's shellfish populations.

"Your support helps us bring the richness of the Long Island Sound into our lives through the food on our plates," said Co-Founder of Foodshed Forum Fairfield County Ali Ghiorse. "By coming together this evening, you are re-shaping our food culture into one that reflects the seasons, while honoring our waterways, landscapes and our communities."

At the heart of the dinner was a celebration of the Sound's lesser known but highly sustainable seafood species. Renowned Connecticut chefs Marta Garcia, Geoff Lazlo, Brian Lewis and Renee Touponce crafted a multi-course experience that told the story of local ingredients, from ceviche of sea robin to green crab chowder. Each course was thoughtfully paired with local wines and beers, connecting guests to the region's food ecosystem.

Kate Masury, now Executive Director of Eating with the Ecosystem, began her career aboard the schooner *SoundWaters*, where she introduced students to the marine life of Long Island Sound through hands-on education. Recently featured in the SoundWaters <u>Sound Impact</u> series, her return to the organization's dinner as a partner in sustainable seafood felt like a meaningful full-circle moment, coming back as a leader helping to protect the very waters where her journey began.

The evening was a compelling tribute to SoundWaters' enduring mission to safeguard and restore the health of Long Island Sound for generations to come. It highlighted the vital partnerships and collaborative efforts driving this work, underscoring the crucial role of environmental stewardship in protecting the rich diversity of marine life that sustains local communities.

"We were founded 36 years ago in response to a crisis, the poor and deteriorating health of Long Island Sound, and we knew education was the key to protecting it," explained Vice President of Development Bob Mazzone. "Today, more than 350,000 students have learned about the Sound across our land and on the water. They leave with a connection to the Sound and the understanding that they have a role in protecting it."

Much like the students SoundWaters teaches, as guests departed, they left with a renewed sense of connection to the Sound and the role each of us plays in its future.
